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OPHIOGLOSSUM CROTALOPHOROIDES WALT. IN TENNESSEE

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ABSTRACT

The bulbous adder's-tongue, *Ophioglossum crotalo-phoroides* Walt., was collected for the first time in Tennessee.

Introduction

Extensive searching by Thomas for *Ophioglossum* crotalophoroides at several locations in southwest Tennessee in April of 1971 and 1972 was unsuccessful. However, on April 29, 1973, Mr. Marx found two small sterile specimens of this fern in a Memphis cemetery. Each specimen had only one small leaf and the rootstock was not collected. No other specimens were seen.

On May 15, 1973 the authors returned to the same site and collected a total of fourteen plants, eight of which were fertile. The plants were much smaller than those growing in Louisiana. They were completely hidden in a thick sod of blue grass, *Poa pratensis* L., and the authors collected them by lying prone on the sod and carefully separating the grass sprig by sprig. This collecting lasted about three hours. *Alchemilla microcarpa* Boiss. and Reut. was the only common herb in the blue grass sod.

On the following day the authors also collected bulbous adder's-tongue in a lawn of a church in Whitehaven, Tennessee.

The senior author has also collected *Ophioglossum* crotalophoroides in Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana (Thomas, 1971), Mississippi (Thomas and Rogers, in press), Alabama, and Georgia. It has also been collected in Florida and South Carolina (Wherry, 1964). The small size and the scarcity of the plants in Memphis perhaps indicates that this is one of the fringes of its range.
