Pat Carpenter has been named the recipient of the prestigious 2000 Tennessee Academy of Science Distinguished Science Teacher Award. Ms. Carpenter, middle school science teacher, Greene County Schools, Greeneville, Tennessee, received the award on November 17, 2000, during the Tennessee Academy of Science Annual meeting in Nashville (Belmont University).

Begun in 1997 by the Tennessee Academy of Science (TAS), the awards program is designed to recognize excellence in science teaching. In addition to the award and a trip to the TAS annual meeting, Ms. Carpenter received a \$500 cash award and a plaque.
