REPORT OF THE EDITOR OF THE JOURNAL OF THE TENNESSEE ACADEMY OF SCIENCE

The Journal of the Tennessee Academy of Science did not reduce its size, the quality of the articles published, or number of illustrations used in 1933. On the contrary, the *Journal* contained more pages, on a wider variety of topics, and more illustrations than in any year in the history of the Tennessee Academy of Science. In 1932, 423 pages were published; in 1933, 436 pages. In 1932, 85 illustrations were used; in 1933, 99 illustrations. In 1932, only 19 separate articles were published; in 1933, 37 different articles were printed in the *Journal*.

Much of the credit for this fine showing should go to our advertisers. They have "stuck" by the *Journal* through this very difficult year. They are all standard firms and handle quality merchandise. All they ask is that you give them a chance to bid on your requirements. We think that you owe them this courtesy.

Much credit is due the members of the Academy who paid wholly or in part the cost of publication of their papers. Especial mention should be made of Drs. C. P. Freeman, Arthur C. Magill, and L. R. Hesler in this connection.

A brief statement of the financial cost and income of the *Journal* for 1933—omitting the income from membership dues and subscriptions—is given in table 1 below.
