

**CARL TABB BAHNER, NEWS EDITOR OF THE  
JOURNAL OF THE

Carl Tabb Bahner was born at Conway, Arkansas, July 14, 1908. At Hendrix College his major was Physical Science and his minor was in Greek. His major for the M.S. degree at the University of Chicago was Organic Chemistry. He spent the next three years at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary taking a Master's degree in Theology, then a year at Yale in graduate study of the Philosophy of Science, Philosophy of Religion, and Christian Education. He spent two years in the Columbia University, Department of Chemical Engineering and completed his Ph.D. thesis in Industrial Organic Chemistry in 1936. He has taught at Hendrix College, Union University, and Carson-



Newman College where he is now completing his 18th year as Professor of Chemistry. He has served as an Examiner (Test Construction) for the U. S. Civil Service Commission and as a consultant to the Regional Products Research Division of the Tennessee Valley Authority, Carbide and Carbon Chemicals Company and Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies. He has served as Chairman of the East Tennessee Section of the American Chemical Society and as President of the Tennessee Academy of Science. His principal interests are the development of young men and women, the integration of science and religion, and cancer chemotherapy. His work has been stimulated by his wife and three children: a son, Maxfield, now attending the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, a daughter, Mary Catherine, who is majoring in Biology at Carson-Newman, and a second daughter, Frances, in high school.
